RYA Young Sailors Stages 1 & 2 Course

Course Fee: £110 - for those using their own Topper **Course Fee: £135** - for those using a club Topper

All course training books and certificates are included in the cost of the course.

Day 1 - Saturday 21st June; 9:00 - 17:00

Day 2 - Sunday 22nd June; 9:00 - 17:00

Day 3 - Saturday 28th June; 9:00 - 17:00

Day 4 - Sunday 29th June; 9:00 - 17:00



This course is ideal for complete beginners and for those who have been attending Junior Saturday Clubs, it will teach the basics for beginners and reinforce knowledge gained previously and expand on this for those with some experience. This course covers Stage 1 & Stage 2 of the RYA Youth Sailing Scheme and is open to young sailors aged 10 to 15 years. It runs concurrently with the adult course, giving parents the opportunity to achieve RYA Level 2 at the same time.

By the end of the course the young sailors will be safety conscious and able to rig and sail a dinghy confidently in light winds. Toppers dinghies will be used and each sailor will be in a boat on their own. Please be aware there are a limited number of club Toppers available and you should use your own Topper if you have one. Numbers on the course are also limited by the number of instructors available. All sessions are held at CMYC.

Booking opens via Web Collect on 1st April 2025

(This may all seem a bit early but Open Day is on 4th May this year, so to avoid disappointment book before then.)

Payment is required by the 14th June and should be made by bank transfer if possible. Any queries? Email <u>Jeff</u> - Bookings close on the 7th June

RYA Start Sailing – Level 1 & 2



Course Fee per person using a club boat: £175

Course Fee per person using own boat: £150

(If you wish to use your own boat, it must be a suitable double handed dinghy large enough for 3 adults)

All course training books and certificates are included in the cost of the course.

This four-day course covers the Start Sailing and Basic Skills syllabi from the RYA National Sailing Scheme. No previous sailing experience is necessary. The course provides a basic knowledge and understanding of dinghy sailing. On successful completion of the course, you will be able to handle a dinghy competently in light wind conditions.

This course is essentially a practical one giving instruction in the basic techniques needed to rig a dinghy. launch, leave the shore, sail around a course involving all points of sailing and return to land. Practical sessions are held on Hedgecourt Lake. Theory sessions required to support the practical aspects of the course along with briefings will be held in the CMYC Clubhouse. The emphasis is very much on a safe, seamanlike approach to sailing.

For this course we use appropriate double-handed dinghies, club dinghies include: RS Quests; Laser 2000; Wanderers and Topaz Omega. You may also use your own boat provided it is capable of holding three adults and considered suitable for the course.

The course is intended for adults and older teenagers, as younger members will have the opportunity to join the RYA Youth Sailing Scheme Stage 1 & Stage 2 course running on the same four days, details elsewhere.



ANGUS BRANSBY R.I.P

Angus was first introduced to sailing by his wife Olive in the late 1960s. He quickly came to enjoy the hobby regularly sailing Lasers, 420s and Mirrors. They joined Crawley Mariners in the early days when the access was from Mill Lane, and the changing room was the back of your car. Angus was one of the signatories on the Club's Articles of Association helping to get CMYC formed, and we thank him for this.

Before the children he built a Mirror dinghy in the front room of the house, and mum took some convincing that it would fit through the door once completed, which included borrowing one to check it would not become a permanent lounge feature.

My fondest memories were of the regular weekend trips with the Wayfarer in tow to the south coast, Angmering, Chichester and my

favourite from Itchenor sailing up to East Head – cruises the Club still does today. Dad enjoyed the windiest days when the sailing was the most exciting, but I think the rest of us were less impressed with getting continually sprayed with water and feeling a bit sick. Eating sandwiches on the beach with flasks of warm drinks, was a good reward.

Dad became a qualified RYA Instructor and we were soon launched out on our own onto Hedgecourt in Mirrors with just a jib sail and Toppers, without any real instructions, I think he assumed we had gained enough hours watching to know what to do, and we always came back.

We enjoyed summer holidays pottering around in boats in Cornwall, and trips abroad to Greece and Turkey for some cruising holidays around the islands.

Angus migrated to Wayfarers and regularly raced through the winters at Bough Beach. After Retiring from work he and some friends set up the Warlingham Yacht Club. Although Warlingham is some 35 miles from the closest bit of coast and to start with his family was not sure they were sailing much more than a pub table, however the club became more serious and chartered boats to sail in the Solent and



across the Channel. He also joined the CMYC on trips to Greece most recently in 2017. My brother and I joined them on that trip and for one of the best holidays we have had.

Angus was always fit, healthy and enthusiastic to help out, he continued sailing up to this summer and joined friends to sail to Jersey in October, before becoming unwell with mesothelioma (asbestosis) and passing away on the 1st February 2025 after 80 years well lived.

Hedgecourt provides a safe place for children to learn and has a great atmosphere to the club with regular trips to the coast. Now his grandchildren take on helm enjoying junior events.

CLUB STRATEGIES IN DETAIL

Since 2024 the CMYC Management Committee has invested time to:

- · ensure continuity of leadership is more easily maintained
- knowledge and responsibilities are shared
- adding a focus on DATE
 - o Development (skills), Activities, Together (Community) and Environment.

Put simply we wish to strengthen and *demonstrate** our community spirit and develop our social dimension for the long-term benefit of the Club.

This has resulted in collaborative Cloud storage, a Knowledge Base Intranet to share information, use of Club specific email addresses, creation of a detailed set of Roles & Responsibilities plus the creation of role and event guides to make everything easier. 2025 also started with a fully integrated activities programme and are introducing the following:

Community Together – Galley Duty

This new duty type has been added for 2025 to support open events and more importantly help you to contribute to and enhance the social aspect of our events.

Community Together – Community Spaces

CMYC are introducing Community Spaces to share the beautiful view across the lake from our Clubhouse grounds with others from the local community, such as residential care homes. This can help with mental health as well as being a social opportunity to care for others and promote this core aspiration.

This will also help promote the Club and with records retained of those organisations we support will actively *demonstrate** our commitment to the wider community.

Community Together - Sailability

A Sailability review started in 2024 using the RYA Assessment guide and the use of two special loan boats to obtain personal feedback. This has culminated in a prioritised approach the Management Committee will use to actively *demonstrate** improvement of our facilities and eliminate barriers to participation for our less abled members.

Skills Development – The Grebe Club

The Grebe Club has been launched to support and *demonstrate** skills development in addition to any formal training the Club offers. Next of these is 06th April – all welcome. This initiative also actively supports all other Club activities such as promoting Cobnor, Open Day (04 May) and is re-introducing youth leadership, and we are working on how to better manage the lake that we all love and rely upon.

*Demonstration of our approach will greatly assist applications for grants and will benefit future Management Committees to receive the RYA Recognition the Club deserves.



THE COMMUNITY SPACES PROJECT

We wish to share this view with local community groups because we believe being outdoors, next to nature, watching the ripples and wildlife on the water helps relieve stress and improves wellbeing and mental health...



Initially we are going to invite local residential care homes with their own mini-bus to host small groups, on-land, not on-the-water, to enjoy what we have to offer...

As I'm sure you know we have a number of classic garden chairs that can be put outside the Clubhouse plus several bench style picnic tables with one situated on a paved path with a single wheelchair position. All other surfaces are loose stone including the car park although there is ample parking.

Our Clubhouse has a small hall with large glazed doors looking over the lake and a small kitchen to one side with kettle, fridge and microwave. Tea, coffee & milk is available. We have two separate male and female changing rooms with toilets as well as a separate disabled toilet.

Who looks after the visiting group?

All care and responsibility remains with the visiting group. We will provide a host who will unlock the grounds, provide a welcome, show the facilities and lock up after the visit.

Who else will be there?

We understand Safeguarding is important and will arrange visits when there are no other planned activities. Sailing Club members are free to attend at any time however, these numbers are very small during the working week. Pre-booking is required for all visits.

How can I recommend a Care Home?

Simply contact us via email (communityspaces@cmyc.co.uk). We aim to respond within five working days. Once we have established contact, we will work to find a date that suits everyone including one of our Community Space Hosts.

How can I become a Community Space Host?

Simply contact us via email (communityspaces@cmyc.co.uk). We welcome your support and aim to respond within five working days.



This is an important community project for us (Crawley Mariners Yacht Club) and we hope you will support this project with visit recommendations and in becoming a CMYC Community Space Host.

DONATIONS & GIFTS

The Tuesday Volunteer Group wanted to express their gratitude to Martyn F., for the gift of a petrol mower that didn't need any servicing and was ready to go and is set to last many years...



We join them in thanking Martyn as this will be used to help keep the vegetation down along the dam wall – the roadside along the lake in Mill Lane (at the other end of the lake to the Clubhouse). This is important because the plants, including the brambles, interweave their way between the sandbags and dislodge the good work of those members that help maintain this area.

This roadside is the Dam, and we are responsible for controlling the water level as part of our flood prevention obligations.

Controlling the brambles and other bits and pieces you accumulate in your boat spaces is down to you so please look at your space and remove any brambles and rubbish:

- ready for the season ahead
- prevent ingress of plastics etc., in the natural habitat, and
- to tidy the grounds prior to Open Day (04th May).

This is also one of our byelaws.

Occasionally we are asked about donations and gifts, and we are always delighted to receive such requests.

If a financial donation is associated with a project or specific purchase, we can even put your name to it as we have with some of our boats.





TREE CUTTING

Come and join our next 'Fun Race' at Junior Saturday Club on 12th April

Open to all Junior/Youth sailors, so do come along and join us.

March saw our first 'Fun Race' of 2025 and yes it was cold and windy. None the less brother and sister (William and Victoria) took part and raced against each other, doing really well in the tricky conditions. This was Victoria's first race and she managed to stay upright in her Oppie throughout the race. William did have one dry capsize in a Topper 4.2 but managed an additional two laps to his sister and came first. They returned with big smiles and were looking forward to the April Fun Race. Having watched the race, one of the other AM Oppie sailors has now decided he will join Victoria for the next one.

Dan and Maria were in the coach boat and were pleased to see how well the two sailor's skills improved during the race.

Next month we will have two brothers racing in an Oppie and Topper joining the other three next month. So do come and join these five sailors for some more fun.

<u>AM sailors</u> can use the boats they have used in the morning session and have a quick warm up before the race starts.

<u>PM sailors</u> need to let us know if they want to race, then we save a boat for you. The race finishes at 1.00pm so you will have time to eat your lunch and join in with your PM group.

The Fun Race is only 25 minute long and if you can tack, gybe and sail a triangle you will have no difficulty in taking part. There will be a support boat and an instructor on the water giving help and advice to anyone that needs it. There will be someone to help get your boat on and off the water and a tow if necessary to get you out to the start line.

For those new to the fun race.

- 1. <u>Find a boat</u> if you are using a club boat ask an instructor to allocate one for you to use. If you have your own boat do ask if you need help rigging
- 2. <u>Sign on</u> Outside the clubhouse there will be a form, please put your full name clearly on it together with the other information required (there will be someone there to help if you are not sure where and what to put).
- 3. **Briefing:** Before the race the person running the race will explain where the race will be and the marks to go around. They will also explain how you will know when the race is about to start and stop.
- 4. Head out to the sailing area by the Maid of Kent.

Looking forward to seeing you there, and it would be lovely to see some new sailors having a go along with the regulars.

When booking on for Saturday Club please say you will be racing. (Many thanks – Diana)









Model Yacht Group News

Our group of DF-65 sailors is steadily growing. At present we meet up on an informal basis on a Wednesday afternoon to practice our helming and boat on boat skills. Ad hoc races tend to ensue, and the boats are very well matched. Did any of you visit the DF stand at the dinghy show? I chatted with John Tushingham there, one of the co-founders of the class and a leading DF helm.

We also now seem to be starting to attract new model yacht members. Expect to see International One Metres (IOM) on the lake shortly. These are a development class rather than a strict one design. I for one look forward to seeing them on the water. We are open to all classes, the more the merrier! Brian Dart has also been busy in his man shed and is rumoured to be building his own IOM on a 3D printer! Watch this space.

What if you don't have a model Yacht? No problem. CMYC now has it own classic Marblehead Yacht. "Bloodaxe" is a big and impressive model with a swing rig and it was designed and built by Roger Stollery. We tested it out last week and it sails beautifully. We have yet to set dates for a formal Club Racing series but we will set one up shortly. We are using the DSRC mobile phone app for our ad hoc races and it seems to fit the need perfectly. You can download it for either Android or iPhone. It provides an audible one minute count down and it can be used with any Bluetooth speaker. It also has a built-in racing and results facility a bit like sail wave or HAL.

As we are all sailing 65cm yachts we do not have the additional complication of handicap calculations. Do come down and meet the group. Someone will almost certainly thrust a transmitter in your direction and you will discover just how much fun model yacht sailing can be.

Spinnaker course report – March 2025

The RYA Dinghy Sailing with Spinnaker course is an advanced module designed to give the participants 'Everything you need to know to sail a boat confidently with conventional or asymmetric spinnakers'. This was looking like a tough ask when day 1 dawned with blue sky but zero wind and perfect reflections on the lake. Fortunately, there was plenty of theory to cover first and by the time we were ready for land drills there was just enough breeze for some demonstrations.



With land drills completed, we rushed to

get on to the water to make the most of what little wind there was - with the forecast being so light we weren't confident how much spinnaker work would be possible. However, with a judicious amount of towing the 2000 and Quest upwind to maximise the time downwind we got a lot more practice that I thought might have been possible. With the breeze being so light it actually enabled everyone to focus on the skills and techniques rather than worrying about boat balance and potentially capsizing.







Spinnaker course report – March 2025

If fact the weather worked out perfectly with Day 2 having significantly more wind (but still glorious sunshine!). This allowed the practice of some of the more advanced principles such as sailing an 'S' shaped course downwind – heading up in the lulls and down in the gusts.



Over a few decades at CMYC I don't think I have ever seen so many spinnakers flown so consistently and for so long.
