

Kill Cord use – update

At our recent RYA annual inspection, we were told that we have to attach the kill cord around the knee or thigh, connecting it back on itself.

I think as a club, we have an excellent record of powerboat helms wearing the kill cord, but many of us have attached it around our ankles on the tiller steered boats, a practice that will have to change.


This change will restrict the powerboat helms movement, the RYA require that if we need to move beyond the normal driving position then we should stop the engine.

Solent & Chichester Cruise Report

My concerns prior to the Solent Cruise on 29th July were twofold. Would I have enough bodies to launch the Ribcraft from the beach at low water and secondly given the forecast, would there be any wind whatsoever. I need not have fretted. Ten stalwart Mariners pulled the safety boat down the beach and launched it. Seafarers sailing Club were on hand nearby with their launching tractor but stood down on seeing what Crawley Mariners could achieve by hand. As to the wind, it was as predicted by the local sailors who prophesied a light breeze to start and a "sailing breeze" by lunchtime. Four dinghies launched, I was helming the Ribcraft ably crewed by Sarah Peay. The engine started first time, I lowered the prop, checked the telltale and engaged gear. All OK. I opened the throttle and nothing! Still just on tickover. My heart sank. No IOW if no Ribcraft! Steve Grey and I lifted the engine cover and Steve's trained engineer's eye spotted the problem straight away. The throttle linkage arm had just fallen off probably from the bouncing over potholes on the road down! Pressed back home and problem solved. Bembridge seemed a tad too far given the uncertain winds so we decided on Wootton Creek where the ferries go as an alternative destination. Our sail across was uneventful (no broken down aircraft carriers this year) and we enjoyed a picnic on a beach just east of the creek entrance. After lunch we headed back along the Island shore keeping clear of the shipping in the main channel before turning north and for home. Another successful Mariners cruise.

For the Chichester Cruise on Sunday 7th July there was certainly no lack of wind. We had a gusty SW F5 which built further about lunchtime. I launched my Victoria 16 from Cobnor with Sarah Peay and Richard Seagroatt as crew. We had two reefs in the main. We crossed to Itchenor and seeing the conditions we opted for a trip up to Dell Quay rather than facing the more exposed conditions towards the harbour entrance. We were met at Itchenor by Steve Grey and Ian Burroughs in Steve's Miracle and by Paul Rawlings and Andrew in a Gull Spirit. We sailed up to Birdham Pool where we enjoyed planing back and forth on some exciting reaches before making our way further up-channel. We saw the Hayling Island B Class lifeboat keep an eye on us as they headed up the channel on a training exercise. On arriving at Dell Quay we were hit by even stronger gusts and even hailstones. July in England! We were made very welcome at Dell Quay SC. They had cancelled their planned family day due to the weather. They put out a table specially for us and we enjoyed tea and wonderful home-made cake. We met the Harbour masters team and chatted over tea. Here we were eventually joined by Paul Hewett and Dave Edgar in Paul's Wanderer. They had opted for a more leisurely full breakfast before sailing. The wind was now augmented by a stiff sea breeze and the tide was starting to ebb giving a "wind over tide" chop as we set sail down channel. We still sailed with the two reefs and left the jib furled. Even so we still had plenty of speed and we were sprayed with salt water as we met the chop. We paused briefly at Itchenor to say goodbye to our friends and then crossed back to Cobnor. It was perhaps not the average summer cruise but everyone enjoyed the challenge. There were few other boats out.

The focus of the day 3 was to learn about the 5 essentials. As the day went on wind came through and gave the sailors a chance to practice the 5 essentials and see what difference they made to their sailing.

Day 4 brought in a light breeze. Whilst we waited for the wind to fill in Mike S taught the sailors some new knots and took them on a tow around the lake. As the wind filled in, we did some fun races, including a sailing backwards race around different course. This gave everyone a chance to practice all the skills we had picked up over the previous days.

Congratulations to Oli Gatton on gaining his Dinghy Instructor certification, his help will be very welcome.

RYA Annual Inspection

Once a year the RYA come and inspect us during a training session to ensure that we are meeting the standards required to be a RYA Recognised Training Centre. There are three aspects to this:

Firstly, going through our relevant policies and procedures, such as Safeguarding, Operating Procedures and Staff Training. Each year the RYA feedback into their requirements from issues, incidents and situations that have arisen around the globe, resulting in some of our documents having to be updated. This year we have two to update, at least no new ones are required. Secondly, they check the boats and equipment used for training, these have to be in good working order. We had a couple of items lacking from the kit on the powerboats, things that have not been picked up on previous occasions. This resulted in a grade A action – something that has to be sorted immediately, this has been resolved.

Thirdly, they check the instruction being given. This involved listening to some of the briefings and watching the groups get afloat. This resulted in another grade A action. The problem was a powerboat helm was wearing the kill cord around the ankle – it now has to be around the knee or thigh. Fortunately, this



has been resolved relatively easily, by making all our instructors aware of how they must attach the kill cord in future and updating our procedures. If you are a powerboat helm please take note.

<u>Junior Saturday Club – July</u>

Our July Junior Saturday Club coincided with several of our regular instructor's holidays and the RYA annual inspection, but we managed to have a DI cover each of the planned groups. We had a big effort clearing the goose poo before the start of the session, with instructors and parents, grandparents even, mucking in – or should that be mucking out? Thanks to everyone who helped throughout the day.

The day started off warm with light winds and ended with torrential rain and stronger winds.

Oppies AM – report by Amy

We had 5 boats for the morning oppie session, made up of some new and more experienced sailors. With the help of the parents we rigged up the oppies and made sure all sailors had helmets and buoyancy aids. Our Assistant Instructors Vanessa and Esther then went through were we sit in the boat and explained how we do a tack. We then went out on the water, where we practiced our beam reach sailing. To finish the session we played a game of collect the floating frogs and balls, all boats managed to collect a frog and some of the sailors came up with some good nicknames for the frogs. It was a successful session and all sailors came off feeling more confident then at the start.

Toppers 2 PM – report by Amy

We started our session with a briefing about how we can use the 5 essentials to improve our light wind sailing and discussed roll tacks and the importance of being on the start line. It was very light wind so we drifted out and slowly sailed round a triangle course. We then practiced our mark rounding skills by doing tight circles around the buoys. As a small bit of wind came though we did some mini races around a sausage course, the group got very competitive and we had some tight races. For a bit of fun we did some capsize drills and managed to get back to the jetty just before the rain storm started. Overall good session and improved skills from all.



August Saturday Club - 'FUN RACE' report by Diana



We had five very keen Topper sailors taking part in the July Fun Race, four with 5.3 rigs and one 4.2 rig. There were three regular sailors joined by one new member - Oscar and Caitlin who had just completed her RYA Stage 1 & 2. The winds were light but everyone managed to do two laps finishing closely together.

Many thanks to Celina for helping with the results and to Matt for laying the course and coaching where necessary.

Hope to see all of you racing again on August 10th at the next Saturday Club. We are always pleased to see newer Topper sailors joining in, as it really helps to improve your sailing skills and find out how easy and good fun racing can be.

The Fun Race is only 25 minute long and starts promptly at 13.00 so that sailors from the AM or PM sessions can join in. If you can tack, gybe and sail a triangle you will have no difficulty in taking part. There will also be a support boat and an instructor on the water giving help and advice to anyone that needs it.

For those new to the fun race.

TIME TABLE:

- 1. Find a boat if you are using a club boat please ask an instructor to allocate you with one or rig your own ready for 12.30.
- 2. Sign on add your name, class of boat, sail number and sail size to the signing-on sheet located just outside the clubhouse.
- 3. Briefing 12.30pm (changed ready to sail) this takes place just outside the clubhouse
- 4. Launch 12.40 head out to the sailing area by the Maid of Kent. The race starts at 13.00 sailors need to be near the MOK about five minutes before that to hear the whistle for the start. Finish after 25 minutes (2/3 laps) Hopefully it is now Summer, so remember you will need suntan lotion and a hat.

If wearing a cap you will need some string to tie it on to your buoyancy aid.

Looking forward to seeing you there, and it would be lovely to see some new sailors as well having a go. (Diana)

Last year we had a great weekend at Itchenor SC with some great results with 1st and 3rd in the ILCA6 and a 3rd in the Topper Fleet. Our Rookies had a great time encountering the many challenges a tidal venue can bring (including lots of towing!). They all went home with big smile.

Once again WSSYSA have organised coaching session before and after the racing each day run by Jack Miller (RS Youth Champion) and Tim Hulse (National ILCA training manager).



They will also be celebrating participation at this event just as much as podium places, so there will be a bumper prize table with something for all participants. There will be a Rookie Fleet for those just setting out on their racing experience, as well as fleets for Fast, Medium and Slow handicap. Fleets will be sorted out into three equal size fleets, plus the Rookie fleet, once all the entries are received

Entry is open to all sailors who are under the age of 19 on the 31st August 2024, sailing monohull and non-foiling dinghies with a PN issued by the RYA. All boats must be able to be identified by having unique sail designations.

Competitors shall enter as teams that are managed by an adult Team Manager. (Team Managers shall have authority to act in loco parentis during the regatta and will ensure competitors are aware of, and have read, all other associated documents.)

West Sussex Regatta 2024

Fleet Description:

- 1. Fast handicap Monohull dinghies with a PN of TBD or lower
- 2. Medium handicap Monohull dinghies with a PN of TBD to TBD
- 3. Slow handicap Monohull dinghies with a PN of TBD or higher
- 4. Rookie Monohull dinghies with a PN of 1139 or higher crewed entirely by rookies

(A 'rookie' is a sailor who has not previously taken part in a significant open regatta away from home other than participating in the 'Rookie' fleet of a previous WSSYSA Regatta (as endorsed by the Team Manager)

We are not able to camp at Cobnor this year as it is a little too far from Shoreham SC, so we will be travelling to this event each day.

Any parents able to tow please let me know, so we can utilise the club's trailers to share towing. We would appreciate a few parents being willing to help with launching and recovering the boats before and after racing, so come suitably dressed and prepared if you are able to help with this. We also need someone to ensure our team trollies stay together whilst sailing is in progress and ensure sailors tally off when they come ashore.

N.B. We have once again been asked to support the event with a powerboat. Please let me know if you would be interested in helping with this either by towing or driving/crewing on one or both days (RYA Safety Boat endorsement required).

BOOKINGS open on Webcollect on the 5th AUGUST. PAYMENT should be made by 31st August

If you are intending to join us, can you please email me asap so that I can send you the Notice of Race, plus the SI's and the loco parentis form for parents to complete and return to me, **no later than 18**th **August**.
